




A close-up of Fr. Reid Hennick (above) and a group photo (below) show the ordinands kneeling before the bishop after offering themselves as candidates for the priesthood.






The End of an Era

This past ordination ceremony, which took place on Friday June 3, was the last to be held by St. Thomas Aquinas Seminary in Winona, Minnesota. The next ordinations will be at the new Seminary in Buckingham County, Virginia; and so these last ordinations, as well as the events surrounding them, were particularly special.

Things began on Thursday evening, when Fr. Jurgen Wegner, superior of the United States District, offered a Votive Mass of the Holy Ghost for the twenty-fifth anniversary of his priestly ordination. After Mass the celebration continued in the Seminary's refectory with a banquet for priests and religious sponsored by the District. Fr. Wegner received a few gifts from the priests and delivered a short address. Fr. Dominique Bourmaud finished the evening with a slideshow about the past, present, and future of STAS, for which he provided a commentary.

Friday morning was a time of high excitement. The bell rang out joyfully as the line of priests, seminarians, and religious wound its way through the sunshine and entered the cool dimness of the large tent. His Excellency Bishop Alfonso de Galarreta ordained seven new priests and nine new deacons in a ceremony that lasted four hours and twenty minutes. The crowd of faithful present was estimated between 3,000 and 3,500.

Late Friday evening devotions were held in the ordination tent in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary. A candle-lit procession had been planned but was canceled because of a storm. As the rain poured and thunder roared, two cantors led the Litany of Loreto and Fr. Yves le Roux guided all present in a meditation on the Blessed Virgin Mary. Hundreds of faithful participated, their candles glowing in the darkness.

Saturday morning saw hundreds more, this time attending the first Masses of the newly ordained priests and crowding around afterwards to kiss the priests' hands and receive their first blessings. At noon a representative of a local business was asked to draw the winning ticket for the Seminary's Cadillac Giveaway. The lucky winner was a lady from Post Falls, Idaho.

Things soon quieted down as the faithful returned to their homes and the new priests began to leave for short vacations before beginning their apostolates. Silence settled on the Seminary once again. The last of the Winona ordinations came to a close. •:•
